Parent to Parent

Learning your child has a disability or special medical needs may be overwhelming, and raise questions and concerns on how to manage your child's needs as well as your own.

Whether your child is newly diagnosed, or going through a difficult transition, **Parent to Parent** offers insightful emotional support through trained **Helping Parent** volunteers, support groups, and information on local resources and services.

HELPING PARENT

Who is a Helping Parent?

A volunteer **Helping Parent** is a parent/guardian of a child with a disability who has been trained in the **Parent to Parent Program**. **Helping Parents** assist other parents through active listening, emotional support, and sharing ideas and resources, while maintaining confidentiality with an accepting, non-judgmental approach.

Who can benefit?

Whether your child has recently been diagnosed or you would like to connect with another parent who has a child with similar experiences or circumstances, a **Helping Parent** can be a great resource for you.

How is a Helping Parent Match made?

SPECIAL EDUCATION SUPPORT

The Arc endorses inclusive education practices, partnering with families, schools and parent/teacher groups to provide assistance and resources to parents/caregivers navigating their child's education and related services.

Services include seminars for parents on 504 plans and IEPs (Individual Education Plans), emotional support, and referrals to community resources. Parents seeking personal 504/IEP meeting prep and note-taking may be matched with a trained **IEP Parent Partner** volunteer.
