Advocacy Spotlight

Matthew Mason and David Buckingham are two engaging young adults who are proactively working on become stronger selfadvocates and learning skills that will help them achieve successful and fulfilled lives.

David and Matthew were selected to represent VOICE (Vocational Opportunities in Community Experiences) at The Community Summit, held in Wenatchee this past June. They embraced the opportunity. They chose to attend presentations and participate in group discussions focused on topics related to transition.

These two friends stood out at the Summit, with their excitement, positive attitude and desire to learn.

When asked to reflect on the most important things they learned while attending the conference, Matthew replied, "People have different ideas about time, and *being on time* means different things to different people. I learned that I need to be mature and stay serious when working. I can't be late to work." He also really enjoyed listening to Father Michael Oleksa's keynote speech on diversity. "His stories were true, but he told them in a really funny way." David attended a breakout session focused on gaining clarity and defining an action plan. He was one of a few participants chosen to be spotlighted. He came away with a realistic plan aimed at helping him obtain a job that would utilize his skills and interests.

Matthew and David welcomed the opportunity to meet and speak to many people with disability diversities. They were inspired by other self-advocates who shared stories of discrimination, hardship, perseverance and success. Although they appreciated and enjoyed the daytime activities, both young men readily agreed that the best part of The Summit was the evening dance! They both would like to return next year and hope to share the experience with some of their peers. David said he was inspired by the experience and felt it would help him to become a better leader.

Recently, Matthew was selected to participate in Project Search, an internship program at Swedish Hospital. He receives classroom instruction focused on work related social skills, combined with volunteer work experience, all within the hospital setting. David is currently working two jobs, one paid, the other volunteer. The first started as a volunteer position through VOICE, which turned into a paid position, when his supervisor recognized his determination and ability. David was told, "You're working so hard. I want to hire you!"

In 2016, David participated in the Youth Leadership Forum for High School Students with Disabilities. It is a unique, week long career leadership-training program. One of the most importing things David has learned to help him prepare for the transition from high school to adult life is, "If you keep working hard, you can live the lifestyle you want in the future."



TRANSITION CLUB is an Arc program, designed for Transition Students (18-21 years) to enhance self-advocacy, self-determination and self-awareness.

Using *Charting the Life Course* tools and information, fun and interactive activities are developed to help the students gain independence and leadership skills, skills necessary for employment and a productive and fulfilling life.

The Arc is currently partnering with six school districts within Snohomish County.

Legislative Updates

After a 105-day regular session plus three 30-day special sessions, the state legislature has finally called an end to their work for 2017. This year negotiations on the final compromise budget was all done behind closed doors and not even legislators knew what was in the budget until the day it was voted on.

Budget Highlights

Amounts listed are total of state and federal funds.

<u>\$79.1 million</u> - Increase the hourly benchmark rate for community residential service providers including supported living, group homes, and licensed staffed residential homes.

<u>\$9.5 million</u> - Service providers for individuals with developmental disabilities, will receive vendor rate increases of 2% on July 1, 2017, and an additional 2% on July 1, 2018.

<u>\$7.5 million</u> - Funding is provided for Developmental Disabilities Administration (DDA) clients who will be leaving high school. Roughly 600 clients will receive employment services through this funding.

<u>\$52.8 million</u> - Funding is provided to implement the 2017-19 collective bargaining agreement with individual providers (IPs) of in-home personal care services.

<u>\$481,000</u> - The work week limit on certain individual providers (IPs) is maintained at 65 hours per week rather than 60 hours per week in FY 2018.

<u>\$6.5 million</u> - Funding is provided for additional state-operated living alternative beds for transitioning clients ready for discharge from the state psychiatric hospitals.

<u>\$590,000</u> - Discharge case managers will focus on transitioning clients ready for discharge from the state psychiatric hospitals into state-operated living alternatives.

<u>\$22.7 million</u> - Beginning with the 2017-18 school year, funding is provided to support an expansion of the state's special education program, increasing maximum state-funded enrollment from 12.7% to 13.5%.

<u>\$1.9 million</u> - Funding is provided for implementation of House Bill 1115 to create a para-educator board and develop specialty certificates in special education that para-educators can obtain.

<u>\$1.6 million</u> - Implement training to increase use of less lethal force in law enforcement, create leadership program.

<u>\$515,000</u> - Implement House Bill 1402 to prevent guardian isolation.

\$153,000 - Create First responder training and add disability information to Enhanced 911 per House Bill 1258.

<u>\$3.2 million</u> - Host the 2018 Special Olympics USA games in July 2018 for approximately 3,500 athletes.

The Capital budget was an even more contentious process. The legislature only came to agreement for a one-year capital budget of re-appropriations, which included:

\$540,000 - Housing Trust Fund DD set-aside

<u>\$4.9 million</u> - Back-up power and electrical feeders at Fircrest.

<u>\$1 million</u> - Infrastructure upgrades at Lakeland Village

The normal 2-year capital budget got hung up on a controversy around water rights and well drilling, and the legislature went home without finalizing anything.
