TRANSPORTATION

Transportation is an essential service of everyday life. Whether it's going to the store, work, a doctor's appointment, or simply visiting a friend, everyone needs transportation. For the DD community accessible transportation continues to be difficult to obtain.

SNOTRAC

Snotrac advocates for connecting people and communities in Snohomish County and beyond with safe, equitable, and accessible transportation. Snotrac's priorities include creating & coordinating mobility services, education, outreach, and engagement, planning & design of livable communities, securing public support & funding, and emergency response coordination. DRW

At Disability Rights Washington, access to transportation is consistently listed as one of the top concerns for their constituents. Those who can't drive or don't have access to a car are more likely to be disabled, BIPOC, indigenous, and immigrants. There are also elders and young people, as well as those who can't afford to own or maintain a vehicle.

DRW believes in a model of change that begins with sharing stories with each other. DRW's organizing and these stories will begin to shift the narrative that only drivers in Washington State have mobility needs worth prioritizing.

COMMUNITY TRANSIT TRAVEL TRAINING PROGRAM

Need help figuring out the bus system? <u>Community Transit's Travel Training program could be the tool you need.</u> The Travel Training program is designed to teach the basic skills necessary to ride Community Transit's bus service. Travel Trainers ride with you during training, guiding you through the transit experience all the way to your destination. Travel Training is geared for anyone who needs a little extra help navigating the transit system, including

- Senior citizens
- Students
- People with disabilities
- Non-English speakers
- New residents
- New riders

The program is customized to meet your individual needs and can last from one hour to several sessions — as long as you need to feel safe and confident. Signing up is easy and there is no cost to you.

What to Know

CONSUMER DIRECTED EMPOLYER

Beginning winter of 2021, the Consumer Directed Employer (CDE) will become the legal employer for Individual Providers (IPs) for in-home personal care. As the legal employer, the CDE will assume all IP employer related responsibilities that are currently managed by the Department of Health and Human Services (DSHS) and Area Agencies on Aging (AAA). For providers in Snohomish County, this will begin January 1, 2022.

The move to a Consumer Directed Employer (CDE) model will shift the IP employment-related activities to the CDE and will help DSHS realize the goal of increasing the capacity of DSHS/AAA case management, customer service, and other social services staff to focus on core case management activities. The contracted CDE vendor is Consumer Direct of Washington (CDWA).

IPs and Clients who receive in-home personal care and respite services will be contacted by DSHS and CDWA with plenty of time to prepare for the transition to the CDE. For Snohomish County, the goal is to have this done by April 1, 2022.

HOME AND COMMUNITY-BASED SERVICES ACCESS ACT

Many people with IDD have to leave their families and live in institutions to receive the daily supports they need because of their disability. The system of services and supports for people with IDD has come a long way in the past 70 years, but many people with IDD and their families still struggle to plan for the services that their loved ones need to live a quality life in the community in the future. Many people with IDD wait years to get off the waiting list for services only to find few direct support professionals available to provide the services they need in the community and even more limited affordable and accessible housing. Even when they do find a home in the community and a trusted professional to meet their needs, they often have to start their search all over again in six months or a year because the turnover in the field is so high. Or worse, they move to another state to be near family after their parent dies and end up on the waiting list for services all over again. Congress has finally proposed a bill, the Home and Community-Based Services Access Act (HAA) to make changes to the system of support for people with disabilities to ensure communitybased services are there for all people with disabilities who want to live their lives in the community, with their friends and family.

Did You Know?

It's never too early to advocate!

The legislative session is right around the corner, but that doesn't mean you can't start advocating! You can continue to reach out to your legislators to tell them the importance of I/DD issues, and participate in other advocacy programs such as legislative coffees. Federal Bills of Interest

Senators Casey (D-PA), Cassidy (R-LA), Hassan (D-NH), and Young (R-IN) and Representatives Bonamici (D-OR), Bucshon (R-IN), McMorris-Rodgers (R-WA), and Kim Schrier (D-WA) introduced the Respond, Innovate, Succeed, Empower Act (RISE Act) (S. 2550, H.R. 4786) in Congress. This bill would improve the process for students who qualify for disability services by requiring colleges to accept a wider variety of documentation to prove their disability, including individualized education programs (IEPs), 504 plans, notices from doctors, and evaluations by psychologists. Additionally, the bill would provide funding for a technical assistance center that provides students and families with information about available disability services. It would also require colleges to report on how many students with disabilities are being served, the accommodations provided, and the outcomes for these students. The Arc of the United States supports this legislation.
